Fraser named in Telecom memo

FORMER prime minister Malcolm Fraser yesterday demanded Telecom explain why his name appears in a restricted internal memo.

He said he had never contacted Telecom about the subject of the memo — a complaint from a Western District businessman — and would query Telecom.

Mr Fraser's request follows the release of a damning government report this week which criticised Telecom for recording conversations without customer permission.

He said he was concerned when Mr Smith rang this week to say their conversation was mentioned in an internal Telecom document. Mr Fraser was named in a memo, obtained under the Freedom of Information Act, and dated April 6, 1993. The document discussed people Mr Smith had contacted about his fight with Telecom.

Mr Smith said he had given the memo to the Federal Police who are investigating Telecom's alleged breaches of privacy.

Last night Telecom said it had written to Mr Smith alleging he had told at least three staff members of his conversation with Mr Fraser. Mr Smith denied this.

Professor blasts PM in tribe jibe


